

## IMPORTANT for all Myeik University students who took part in the first internship programme

All 10 Myeik University students who participated in the first internships programme to FFI, Friends of Wildlife, MBNS or Harrison Institute are requested to:

- Prepare a 10 minute (maximum) presentation about some aspect of their internship
- Present this talk on 5 March (morning) at the upcoming workshop in Myeik University (2-10 March, 2020). Those interns from Mandalay University will present at a Mandalay workshop later in 2020.

Please

- Decide amongst yourselves which part of the internship you wish to present – the talks should be different for each intern and should include different aspects of the internship
- Design an attractive, logical and well-illustrated talk, which should include:
  - A title, your name, position (eg Demonstrator and/or MSc student or...), name of your department and your university name (ie Myeik!)
  - The dates of your internship, including year
  - Logos of the Myeik university, of MuEuCAP and the EU (if you are not sure, look at the MuEuCAP website for the logos)
  - Useful graphics – e.g. a map of Myanmar that highlights the particular areas you are talking about in your presentation – you have an international audience who may not be familiar with Myanmar geography
  - Photographs that illustrate what you did – for example photos of you undertaking camera trapping or radio telemetry.

We need to know:

- Short background information about you - e.g. 'My name is..., I am a second year MSc student in the Marine Science Department...studying ....'
- Short background information about the NGO you visited (try to think of some different aspects of the NGO for each talk – we don't want repetition from two interns who went to the same NGO – for example, one intern might talk about FFI's role in forest conservation; another about FFI's role in marine conservation...
- Short background information about the subject you are presenting – e.g. 'I am going to talk about FFI's training programme in camera trapping and radio telemetry....these two techniques are used in FFI's survey and monitoring work....survey and monitoring work is important because...these two techniques provide information on....'
- Inform the audience of what you did. 'When we were in the forest, we set 3 camera traps...the camera traps were set on trees at one metre height....we wished to observe what larger mammals...birds...lived in this forest....we were particularly interested in....'
- Inform the audience about any results...'We found two mammal species on our cameras from the trap....they were....'
- Tell the audience what you think was the most important aspect of the internship – ie what did you learn, which was the best experience, what you enjoyed, what you didn't enjoy and how being on the internship might inform your career choice in the future. Explain to other students in the audience how they might benefit from being on an internship.

Please remember - You are telling a story to the audience so that they can understand all aspects of what you are talking about. It needs to be informative, interesting, and understandable.

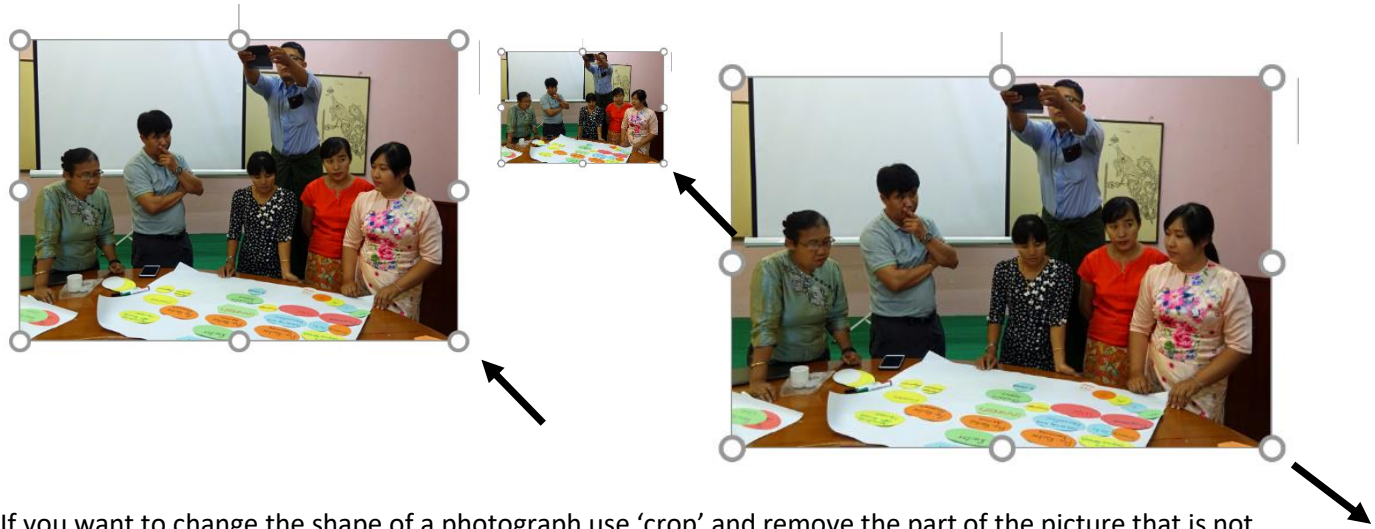
Photographs help with this – photographs of the habitat, your work, the animals...(but only if relevant). Keep all text short. Write brief sentences (no long descriptions).

For photographs, it is important that you learn to crop and cut correctly. You must always keep the correct aspect ratio - the proportional relationship between an image's width and height (check the internet, if you don't understand) – otherwise it looks weird.

Do not do this, it is totally horrible (unless you like strangely elongated or flattened humans):



If you want to reduce or increase the size a photograph, click on a corner (never in the middle)



If you want to change the shape of a photograph use 'crop' and remove the part of the picture that is not important to the story.
